

PROJECT MANAGEMENT, M.S.

Offered through Saint Louis University's School for Professional Studies, students learn strategy, communication, analysis and management skills for leading complex projects across multiple industries, including information technology, healthcare, financial services, manufacturing, professional services and construction. Project-based learning and class simulators prepare students to promote the widespread applicability of the five basic project management processes as outlined in the PMBOK®: initiating, planning, executing, monitoring and controlling, and closing. Students join a learning network of peers and experts from around the world to develop solutions to project management problems. As a Registered Education Provider (REP) of the Project Management Institute (PMI), Saint Louis University prepares students to achieve and maintain the Project Management Professional (PMP)®, Program Management Professional (PgMP)®, and other PMI professional credentials.

Careers

Successful organizations depend on the skills of project managers to navigate people through change. The field of project management is expanding and influencing the way large and small organizations conduct business across many industries. Graduates are prepared to hold a variety of leadership roles which are responsible for delivering new programs, products and services through a collaborative, disciplined approach to project management.

Admission Requirements

- An undergraduate degree from an accredited institution
- Most successful applicants have an undergraduate grade point average of 3.0 or better
- Two or more years of work experience is recommended (full-time or part-time employment, internships, co-ops and similar experiences)

Application Requirements

- Application form and fee
- Transcript(s)
- Three external reference evaluations
- Résumé
- An essay of about 500 words that describes:
 - What attracted you to this program?
 - How will a master's degree in this field benefit you in your present or future career?

Requirements for International Students

All admission policies and requirements for domestic students apply to international students along with the following:

- Demonstrate English language proficiency. Some examples of demonstrated English language proficiency include minimum score requirements for the following standardized tests:
 - Paper-based TOEFL: 550
 - Internet-based TOEFL: 80
 - IELTS: 6.5
 - PTE: 54
- Academic records, in English translation, of students who have undertaken postsecondary studies outside the United States must include the courses taken and/or lectures attended, practical laboratory work, the maximum and minimum grades attainable, the grades earned or the results of all end-of-term examinations, and any honors or degrees received. WES and ECE transcripts are accepted.

- Proof of financial support, which must include:
 - A letter of financial support from the person(s) or sponsoring agency funding the time at Saint Louis University
 - A letter from the sponsor's bank verifying that the funds are available and will be for the duration of study at the University

Application and Assistantship Deadlines

Students should apply for the fall semester by July 1 and for the spring semester by Nov. 1.

The application deadlines for international students are: May 15 (fall), October 1 (spring) and February 1 (summer).

Students seeking assistantships should apply by Feb. 1.

Review Process

Application decisions are made per guidelines and a review process established by the department, school or college.

Scholarships and Financial Aid

For priority consideration for graduate assistantships, applicants should complete their applications by February 1.
